The purpose of this report is to review events and activities for the Baltimore Heritage Quilt Guild. Our by-laws define the Guild's purpose: The purpose of the Guild is to preserve and promote knowledge of the art and craft of quilts and quilt making to all interested persons in the Greater Baltimore Area. The Guild holds monthly meetings, often with speakers, and hosts a biennial quilt show open to the public. Additionally, the Guild sponsors periodic quilting classes for its members and other interested people and offers quilting demonstrations to inform the public about the art of quilting. Members of the Guild also make quilts to donate to charitable organizations.

The Come and Go Day Retreat is held locally once a year in January or February. The cost is about \$25 for two full days! This Come and Go Day Retreat is perfect for people with busy schedules. You can come and go for as little or long as you like. Our Guild members really like to share ideas for patterns, sewing tips, gadgets, and layout designs.

Community Outreach – Ruthie Gumnitsky

The Community Outreach committee acts as a liaison between our quilters and the non-quilting community through educational events and charity quilts. We represent the guild to the public, hoping to contribute in a positive way.

To make this happen, the committee chair has the following jobs:

- connect with charitable organizations, accessing needs and offering help if asked
- collect charity quilts donated by members, attach guild label and deliver to organization
- collect fabric and materials from guild members and the general public to be used in charity quilts

• schedule "charity quilt-a-thons" where members sort and cut donated fabric, organize into kits, sew blocks, and prepare quilt sandwiches for quilting and binding.

- order batting and backing fabric to be used in charity quilts
- contribute article to the monthly newsletter
- exhibit our good-works and provide a hands-on quilting experience at EXPO
- collect completed pet beds and cat wraps and deliver to animal shelters

EXPO: Showcasing our Love for Quilting

Every two years, we share our love of quilting by showcasing quilts made by our members. This year members exhibited 400 quilts. The show was held April 26-27 from 10 am until 5 pm in the 4H/Homearts Building at the

Maryland State Fairgrounds. We welcomed 1800 visitors at EXPO 2025!

The EXPO is a fun-filled, and very busy, weekend that enables us to explore the enjoyment, skill, and historic significance of quilting with scores of others. In addition to amazing quilts, the EXPO also features many vendors, our own booth where Guild members sell items, a "Buy It or Bid It" booth where visitors can purchase or bid on quilts and other items donated by members, a quilt raffle, a sewing machine raffle, raffle baskets, demos, and classes. We also had a memorial exhibit dedicated to recently deceased long-time member Mary Stewart.

The EXPO is managed and staffed by Guild members, and the proceeds from the EXPO are used to fund our teaching and outreach activities, including bringing in nationally recognized teachers and funding the supplies needed for our extensive charity quilt program.

The Guild Library was allocated \$150 to purchase books in 2024-25. We added 8 titles to our collection of 332 books. At each general Guild meeting we put books from the shelves in the storeroom onto our book truck so that every 4 months the collection is rotated for Guild members to select books. New titles are announced in the monthly Guild Newsletter and are in a special box on the book truck.

After the last Guild meeting in June, we reshelve all the books and conduct an inventory, removing some titles which are older than 20 years (with broad exceptions for local interest books).

The Guild was well represented with entries in the State Fair and several ribbons were awarded.

The Fall Retreat at Bongiorno followed at the end of September. Kathy Fader was presented with a wall hanging signature quilt to remember her time as retreat "Sheriff". Cathy Kleeman has stepped into the job.

Buoyed by our memories we looked forward toward planning EXPO 2025. Co-Chairs Linda Anderson and Sally Wingo held the first committee Meeting on September 17 in the meeting room at Cross Keys. Marty Vint and a team of volunteers began working on the Raffle Quilt named Baltimore Charm.

Ellie Hofstetter began taking Stash to Treasure donations before General Meetings.

October 2024: At our General meeting Terry Rowland from Alberta, Canada Zoomed in to present "Scrap Attack". On October 17, Outreach Chair Ruthie Gumnitzky hosted a Charm Square-a-thon to sew 5-inch squares into charity quilts. She also worked with Linda Barone to complete a quilt for Woodlawn Middle School using squares the students made.

November 2024:

Our speaker at the General Meeting was Tammy Wycherley from West Virginia. She is a certified Laura Heine instructor and presented in person. She also taught a workshop the next day at Towson United Methodist Church.

December 2024:

At our festive end-of-year General Meeting we revealed the yearlong Bucket List/UFO challenge, enjoyed games (Bingo!) and holiday treats provided by members (Last name A-M brought sweets and N-Z main dish or savory).

OUR EXPO RAFFLES were revealed in the December Newsletter. Baltimore Charm Quilt was ready to be shown to sell raffle tickets, and Barbara Shelton introduced the Bernina 475 Kaffe Edition sewing machine.

January 2025:

Because of possible winter weather conditions, we had in-person and Zoom meetings in January and February. Our speakers were on Zoom. The January speaker was Pam Weeks who presented her lecture "Women's Writes—Signature Quilts."

Community Outreach continued its charitable quilt giving and even inspired a non-member who made and donated a puff quilt. We were also still making pet beds and cat wrap blankets for kennels.

The Come and Go Retreat was January 24-25 at Towson United Methodist Church.

February 2025:

May 2025:

a very large workroom and an eight-foot table each strategically surrounded by specialty tables for ironing, laying out fabric, and cutting, the plan of which is dictated by our layout person.

Other activities include a SWAG exchange, trips to the local quilt shop, and a block exchange.

Beds are made up for us and linens are supplied in our personal bathrooms. Most people request private rooms, but there are doubles available if you register as such.

These retreats are tremendous fun and there is great time for building new relationships while you are laboring on a new masterpiece.
